Progression to the Bachelor of Career Development

Introduction

This plan is for graduates of the Diploma in Career Guidance (DipCG) who are enquiring about how to progress onto NMIT's Bachelor of Career Development (BCD).

The Bachelor of Career Development will be available online with NMIT in Semester 1 2018.

NMIT enrolments, and BCD liaison person are pleased to help with any queries from DipCG students about how this process will work for them.

The process

To progress from the DipCG to the BCD, you need to know how much your qualification and your experience can be counted through Recognition of Academic Credit (known as RAC). RAC can include both direct Cross Credit and Recognition of Prior Learning (known as RPL) towards the Bachelor of Career Development.

The process can include you providing evidence of;

- Your experience in practice in the career development field
- The number of credits you have achieved on the DipCG
- Your experience with the cultural practice components that are a requirement of the Bachelor of Career Development

Please note that a maximum of <u>240 credits</u> can be approved through the Recognition of Academic Credit process.

The following information is to help explain the possible progression to the 360 credit Bachelor of Career Development.

<u>Scenario</u>: You have completed the Diploma in Career Guidance (Level 6) and would like to enrol in the Bachelor of Career Development.

- 1. Complete your Application to the Bachelor of Career Development
- 2. Discuss the Recognition of Academic Credit (RAC) process with the Bachelor of Career Development liaison at NMIT and you will then be sent the required RAC forms.
- 3. Complete the RAC forms that will have received and send the forms back to the Social Science Administrator at NMIT along with any information requested.
- 4. NMIT will check your RAC forms and start the approval process. You will then be notified of the outcome and what courses to enrol on.

How the RAC process will apply in your case.

The 240 credits from Level 5 and 6 of the Bachelor of Career Development can be recognised through; Learning outcomes in the DipCG, recognition of other academic study and practice in the career development field

- 1. 90 of the 120 credits you already have from the DipCG can be directly <u>Cross Credited</u> to the BCD.
- 2. There are a remaining <u>150 credits</u> to be identified, to receive credit for the full 240 credits, (Level 5 and 6 of the degree).
- 3. Some of this credit will come directly from Learning Outcomes <u>already met</u> across courses in the DipCG, as identified on the RAC application form.
- 5. There are some remaining Learning Outcomes that <u>are yet to be evidenced</u>. These are listed on the following pages and will help you gather evidence as to how these Learning Outcomes have been met; eg. employer letters, or grades transcripts from other study. This is called Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL). Evidence can come from work or <u>other</u> study and validation of practicum hours that you have done. The information and evidence gathered, can then be included in your RAC application. Evidence may apply across more than one Learning Outcome.

If all RAC requirements are met and approved, you can enrol in BCD 120 credits and complete the degree. If not met, a study pathway will be discussed with you.
